n June 30, 2000, Helene Riesen's retirement from Westgate became official. For twenty-one-and-a-half years Helene Riesen was an integral part of the day-to-day activity at Westgate.

As a grade seven student you began at Westgate with Mrs Riesen's Religion class where the stories in the Old Testament took on a reality that was very applicable to your daily life.

In grades 8 and 9 students saw and felt the love of mathematics that has been Helene's trademark forever. After two years with Mrs Riesen many students believed, like she did, that God is a Mathematician.

Helene will also be remembered for the many cakes she treated her students to. There didn't need to be a significant reason other than it was time to celebrate and what better way than to eat cake.

For many years Helene also served as the staff rep on Junior Student Council. It is here that she imparted so many leadership skills to many a young student. Students learned to make speeches, articulate ideas, plan events for 150 students, and think clearly through decisions so the best interests of the entire group were kept in mind.

Eight years ago Helene's job description at Westgate changed as she assumed the role of Vice Principal. Her gifts in administration were felt immediately as she worked with our attendance policy, staff manual, and the day-to-day running of the school

Students, staff, and school community have experienced the keen sense of honesty and great integrity in all that Helene does. Even when in trouble it was comforting for students to know that Mrs. Riesen would be incredibly fair.

Now that she is retired, Helene will have more time for the company she and her husband run, Riesen Travel. In addition, Helene has already been asked to work as a Faculty Advisor for the Faculty of Education at University of Manitoba.

Through it all, Helene's love for teaching, students, staff, and Westgate have been a blessing. Her unalterable and undying enthusiasm has been motivation for us all. We are the better place because of the time Helene Riesen spent at our school.



## FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

#### FEET TOO BIG?

The year is off to a wonderful beginning. There is particular pleasure in walking I through the halls at school to be greeted by big smiles and "Hi Mr. K" or a friendly "Good Morning." Of course my assessment of the year to date is not just based on the happy greetings that are exchanged between the students and the principal. There is more, a lot more. I believe the discussions by Board and Staff about Nurturing Faith (last year and now this year) and what that means in our school is already at work. The concrete plans are yet to be made, but the discussion has made us all more aware of what it means to nurture faith in ourselves and our students. God is at work, of that I am sure.

What else, you ask? Last year our fledgling Advanced Placement program had its first AP Scholar, one of ten in Manitoba. In addition to this, 35% of our graduates received scholarships from a variety of post secondary institutions.

This year students are again working at their studies diligently. In addition many of them have chosen to participate in the co-curricular activities. Our Varsity Girls volleyball team moved from AAA to AAAA

this year and is presently ranked number one in the province. We are blessed this year with a record thirteen German Exchange students who will be with us for the first three months of school.

There are many more activities I would share with you but space does not allow. In an attempt to summarize what all these activities mean I quote Brother Eagan Hunter. In his article entitled "The Myth of Adolescence," as found in the Principal Leadership September 2000 issue, he states that our task as adults is to give youth "a sense of self-worth and a true evaluation of their knowledge, skills, and abilities, while providing opportunities for them to grow, develop. and reach their full potential."

I would presume none of us would argue with this statement. But as we near the completion of year 2000 I wonder how we will fulfill this educational commission in the year 2005 or 2010? Will we accomplish it the same way we do today? What will future student needs require? At Westgate where we often find facilities crowded and little or no space to consider new or revamped programs I cannot help but wonder how we will be meeting the ever-changing needs of



students in ten years. Will we be able to continue to "inspire and empower students to live as people of God?"


The Board has already begun to do some research in an attempt to answer these questions. Let me use the words from the Opening Program of our Board Chair that so aptly describe our situation, "Our feet have grown too big for our shoes and our neighbors tell us that our feet stink." This is a situation which has made it ever more difficult to serve our students. It is important to state that our staff does an incredible job given the limited space available. My fear, if the truth be known, is that we will find ourselves at a place in the future only to realize that we have missed the turn and are not meeting the needs of our students.

The time then has come for careful inspection of future possibilities for Westgate Mennonite Collegiate. In order to choose the right course we will need to pray for: God's guidance, patience to listen to each other, and the ability to discern the needs of our students. May God grant us wisdom as we peer into the future.

#### LIBRARY

In recent years, Westgate's library has seen a huge increase in use, by both individual students and classes with their teachers. While it is sometimes overwhelming to be so busy, this is really a very encouraging sign that the library's programs and holdings are seen as helpful and appropriate in supporting the courses being taught. It also spurs us on to keep up with changes in curriculum, and with approaches taken by different teachers in the same subject areas.

Without the help of the teachers—
recommending books, giving us copies of
course outlines and assignments,
discussing material needed, letting us
know when we've missed an item on the
shelves that could only be classified as
"vintage"—we would have a more
difficult time having the right material on
hand when it is needed.

Of course, once we know what we need, we have to locate it and pay for it. This is where the incredible support of parents and other donors has been so important. While we have a generous budget, anyone who has bought books recently will realize that the cost adds up very quickly. Our annual book sale at the opening program is an opportunity for our constituents to see the the type of material staff and students are looking for. We have selected most of these items with input from people in many different areas of interest or specialization. We

then search publishers' catalogues, bookstores and other resources to locate what has been requested. Having these books then purchased for the library by those attending the program means we can develop our collection even further. So far we have never been disappointed by the response from those supporters! THANK YOU to all those who have contributed so generously over the years, at these sales and with other donations of both money and volunteer time.

The library has kept up with advances in technology in the last few years. Computer tools such as the Magazine Article Summaries databases, encyclopedias, allases, and the Internet have greatly increased the amount of material available to our students. As with most new things there have been some growing pains (students studying rock and roll musicians are cautioned not to enter "The Barenaked Ladies" as an Internet search!) but overall the positive results have far outweighed the frustrations.

This past summer we embarked on what must be one of the most significant changes in the library in many years.

Thanks to a generous donation, we have been able to automate the circulation and catalogue in our library, making it possible for students and staff to have access to the catalogue records on the computers. It also enables us to keep

more current records and makes tracking of items much easier. This project began with a thorough weeding of our collection and then the entry of all book records into the library software program. Karen Barg Camacho, who was hired for the summer, and Andrea Kroeker, a dedicated student volunteer with a keen interest in the project, undertook this job. Through their hard work—almost 6000 records input—we were up and running on August 30.

Now that we no longer have cards to type, we look forward to dedicating more time to helping students and staff with their research projects and assignments, or just finding a good book to read. You are always welcome to drop in and check out the library; we'll try to make room for you too!

# **WESTGATE'S FRIENDS IN SERVICE**

#### GREETINGS FROM MEXICO!

In September 1999 I started a three-year term with MCC in Mexico. Officially I am a community development worker in a region of the state of Guerrero called "La Montana." Three distinct indigenous groups, all of whom are extremely impoverished economically, dominate the region. My focus is on women's issues and appropriate technology, which means that I help develop and promote things like stoves made of clay and sand that have chimneys so that women burn less wood and inhale less smoke while they are cooking.

I decided to work with MCC because I have always been interested in "seeing the world," not as a tourist, but by working and living alongside God's people. Working in Mexico has given me the opportunity to learn a new language and gain a new perspective on the world as a Christian living among the poor. I have found the people of Mexico to be incredibly patient, friendly and hospitable. I feel extremely blessed to be living among such generous people. — Ms. Sharon Campbell

fiter 3 months here, I'd have to agree with Shakespeare. I'm teaching high school English at Rosslyn Academy, an international mission school on the outskirts of Nairobi. The diversity of my students is amazing, as 10-12 different countries are represented in most classes. Class discussions often bring out interesting contrasts between each student's culture and experience.

In fact, "contrast" is probably the most defining word to describe life in general in Kenya. When it's light, it's very light and when it's dark, it's very dark as power rations force me to do everything from cooking to showering to marking papers by candlelight. (Candlelight has lost some of its charm . . . ).

The intense dryness of the land in much of Kenya is contrasted with the rich green vegetation in other areas, like the school campus. Trees that I though existed only in Dr. Seuss books grow defiantly green in the midst of the drought.

The warmth and friendliness of the Kenyan people is contrasted with the fear and caution that comes with the constant threat of attack or invasion ... the wealth of the upper class who drive BMWs and shop at luxurious malls, contrasted with the devastating poverty of millions of street kids and slum residents ...

I'm so thankful for my time at Westgate. Although they don't know it, my students here are benefiting from your influence.
