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### VOLLEYBALLERS HOLD A QUARTER-CENTURY CELEBRATION

In the fall of 1978, Westgate made its own history by becoming the smallest school to win what are now the AAAA Volleyball Championships. Today, only the largest schools in the province compete at this level, but Westgate won it all 25 years ago despite a high school population of about 98 students.

Westgate edged out Murdock McKay in five sets to meet Miles Macdonell Collegiate in the finals. Chances were not good, for in five consecutive previous tournaments, Westgate had not won a single set, let alone a match, against the five-time defending provincial champions. In the championship game, Miles Mac won the first two sets fairly handily and were leading in the third set by a score of 11-5. What followed is deeply embedded in Westgate Iore. Erich Enns, not a starter, but a great front-line player, was substituted into the game. As legend has it, he walked onto the floor, eyeballed each of the Miles Mac frontline players, and emphatically whispered to each in turn, "I've got you, I've got you, and I've got you!" In the ensuing play, Erich stuffed the Miles Mac right-side hitter, followed by a stuff block on a short set to their middle hitter, followed by a stuff block of their left side-hitter. The rest is history, as Westgate went on to win that set, and the next two, to win the provincial championship.

Harry Toews and Erich Enns planned the twenty-fifth Championship anniversary reunion that featured the 1978 Westgate Knights versus the 2003 Westgate Wings. It was a grand evening that was marked by the presentation of a plaque dedicated to the volunteer groups and individuals

who made the building of the gymnasium possible. Frank Enns and Gerry Grunau returned to coach the alum team, and many fans who were at the Championship game in 1978 were sprinkled among the packed crowd. The audience marvelled at the agility and skill of the more seasoned

veterans, who were edged out by the younger squad of boys. As for a fiftieth reunion, Erich Enns' only word was, "No."

As a pastor of one of the supporting churches, I expect to retain a connection with the school in a continuing way, as many of our congregation's youth are students at Westgate. I suspect that our involvement with Westgate will feel different now, but I think our relationship with the school will continue in a new way.

Westgate's Service Credit option offers Sr. 2-4 students a chance to learn practical leadership skills of goal setting, effective communication and coordination of group activities. This year, the class assumed some school promotion responsibilities. Service Credit students planned and facilitated the school's inaugural Grade Six Day. The Service Credit class hosted over 40 students from the constituent churches and community for an afternoon of school tours, devotions, games and snacks. The class also designed and constructed a promotional board that is

used for church visitations and deputations.

This program is also designed to attend to community needs. On one of the coldest days of winter, Service Credit students spent the morning volunteering at Winnipeg Harvest, and delivered the 715 lbs. of food donated by our junior students. We encourage students to become involved in the Service Credit option and develop leadership skills as the program continues to grow in its ability to offer service to the school and the greater community.

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### **OUR FUTURE CAMPUS PLANS**

he Westgate Mennonite Collegiate Exploration Committee was formed by I the Westgate Board of Directors to make recommendations regarding the future facilities for Westgate Mennonite Collegiate. This led to the questions, "What is the possibility of expanding or upgrading our facilities at 86 West Gate?" and "What enrolment can the school expect in the future?" To answer the first question, the committee initiated a survey of the Armstrong's Point residents. That survey was completed and presented to the Board in 2002. To answer the second question, it evaluated the potential for growth in enrolment with another survey of the twelve churches that own it and focussed on the population of eligible children in those churches.

The survey of the supporting churches concluded that the population of children attending the supporting churches will decline for the next ten years, though this decline is not shared equally by all of the churches. In response, the school has included a special afternoon for Grade Six students to visit and take part in activities during a regular school day.

Westgate continues to work with neighbours. In the past, issues of parking, storage, traffic, and general level of activity have been perceived by the residents of Armstrong's Point to be threats to the stately and gracious atmosphere of the neighbourhood. The school has continued to try to live as good neighbours, and to be sensitive to the issues raised. Our facilities are open to the community, and have recently been used for a wedding and a fall supper. Residents have been invited to school events, and Westgate maintains a membership in the APA.

The Committee recommends that the school continue to develop credibility with the APA by being open and candid with the school's development plans. As well, the school will continue to develop

relationships with the neighbours by informing them directly of activities that will affect them.

In conclusion, the Committee recommends that Westgate Mennonite Collegiate stay at 86 West Gate and continues to work on plans that most effectively use our building to support our school programs, and to maintain positive relationships with our churches and neighbourhood.



### **BUILDING BETTER BRIDGES**

Thinking of going into engineering? Ever wonder how bridges are constructed? Desperate to know what designs are best for a bridge that has a span of 24 cm? Just ask the Physics 30S class! Students were busy designing, constructing and testing bridges made out of toothpicks and glue during the month of December. The project walked them through the study of various truss designs as well as the concepts of compression and tension.

This year, the 2-year-old record for most weight supported by a bridge was shattered: Andrew Froese, Sydney Woodman, and Tom McKibbin combined their efforts to create this award-winning design. The "true" test of a bridge's design was to see how many textbooks could be stacked on top of its roadbed. The trio's bridge held almost 39 kilograms of texts, and had a capacity for more, as one member stood on the bridge and it withstood over 70 kg of mass!

Students of the physics program are looking forward to Robot Sumo Wrestling, which is a part of term three in Physics 408. Knowledge of electricity circuits, forces, and construction skills are put to the test as groups compete to push others' robots out of the ring. "Macy," I call out. Eighteen eager little Chinese faces look up at me as she responds with a triumphant "Here!" I have the privilege of working with some really great kids. Beth is a budding artist who spends her break time up at the



blackboard drawing pictures of the stuff that she has just learned, waiting for my approval. Chris is five years old and only 31/2 feet tall. Even though he is younger than every other kid in the class, I depend on him for the right answer when everyone else's face is blank. He is too short to sit and still see over his desk so every time he replies with the right answer, a smile comes to my face as I am reminded that he is actually standing. And then there is Amy. I cannot remember a class when she has not tried to sneak up on me to try and get me to chase her. Or there's Pamela, who comes up to me at the end of every class to ask how to pronounce all the new words again so that she can race home to teach her grandmother. And of course Jessica, who waits for me after class to hold my hand and walk me to the front gate. There is no better feeling than walking out of a classroom knowing that you have really connected with kids.

KATE GIESBRECHT ('02) writes: Wog'wan! Greetings to you all from Jamaica! I have been here for one month and will be staying for the next 21/2 with a non-profit government organization called Canada World Youth, which caters to Canadian youth ages 17 to 24, who wish to experience another culture doing volunteer work abroad. My specific program is a partnership between the Canadian and Jamaican governments and lasts for seven months, with a focus on literacy. The 31/2 month Canadian phase of the program took place in a small fishing town on Prince Edward Island, I spent August to November 2003 working at the local kindergarten. Eighteen of us (nine Canadians and nine Jamaicans) are in a small cluster of communities called Siloah in the parish of St. Elizabeth, Tamaica.

Living in a foreign country can be very difficult, but also very fulfilling. Some obstacles are the climate change, (55°C heat), language barriers, (the local Croole is

treasured by Jamaicans, but hard to catch on to), differences in cultural norms, and severe homesickness. However, the view from my front yard is a vast field of sugar cane, behind which is a lush and rising landscape of tropical trees. My yard itself is a virtual orchard with coconut, banan, mango, grapefruit, tangerine, cherry, and orange trees. The people are friendly (sometimes too friendly by my Canadian standards), and the music, which is inescapable, is intoxicating and full of energy.

I've gained an incredible amount of knowledge and experience during this short but intense chapter of my life. More important, however, is that I am now able to fully appreciate how fortunate I am. I challenge you all to do what I could not look around at your life, your loved ones, and your home environment, and truly thank God for the abundance of blessings you have. I only hope that this experience will stay with me forever, so that I may never forget the sentiment behind these sincere words.
