magine the vast savanna, dry from three years of drought, a few lone acacia trees offering the only shelter from the blazing sun. The ground is dry and any living plant is covered in thistles and thorns. Here under the tree, I pull up a stone and receive a drink of sweet tea and goat's milk from a beautiful stranger who honours me with this gift because of our common humanity. In my time at Westgate since '93, I have received sick leave and maternity leave, but this latest leave—I call it a "life learning leave" has been a true blessing and time of renewal.

For most of October and part of November, my family had the privilege of travelling to Kenya on a Mennonite tour. The experience was wonderful and

the village of Najile, Kenya, has been forever etched into our lives.

The primary goal of the trip was to record music with Maasai choirs for the recently released CD, "Take Your Place," by Darryl Neustaedter Barg and Kim Thiessen. This CD is part of an ongoing project to raise funds and awareness for MCC's HIV/AIDS work around the world. We are grateful for the way the Westgate community helped make this possible.

A highlight for me was spending time with people who were living with HIV and AIDS. They are people just like me with loving families, daily struggles, hopes and dreams. The courage and joy they found through their faith and the help they were receiving through MCC's work was inspiring.

Another highlight was the opportunity to work with girls in the local school who had expressed interest in starting a Peace Club. I loved the enthusiasm they expressed as we worked through basic ideas of conflict resolution and peace.

Our family's highlight was the hospitality we experienced and friendships we formed. We were also quite pleased to have encountered amazing wildlife. Overall, the three-and-a-half weeks were short yet profound. I am not sure I will ever look at a cup of Chai tea in the same way. They had so little and gave so much.



RECOLLECTIONS OF A WESTGATE MIDDLE EAST TRIP

write these thoughts only a few days after returning, but the Middle East already seems so far away. It was our largest group ever: twenty four students and four chaperones. We spent our last night on the roof of the Ecce Homo Convent in the Old City of Jerusalem, reflecting on our time together. Each of us shared our highlights-many could not stop at one-and each highlight brought on a lively discussion. We remembered Damascus—singing songs in the acoustic chambers of the Turkish baths, speaking to niqab-hidden women in the Ummayyad Mosque; we recalled Lebanon—dancing the dabke with the friendly neighbours, playing basketball with students at the Schneller Schule, driving through the dizzying traffic as we

middle of the desert, proudly waving on the top of the rock bridge.

We also reflected on our time in Israel/ Palestine, trying to understand the reality of the occupation. We saw the occupation from three angles. First, we listened to Angela from the Israeli Commission Against House Demolitions. Angela explained her story. As an Israeli citizen, she could no longer accept the reasons her government was giving for the occupation; she could not support settlement building or the demolition of Palestinian homes. Second, we listened to Ayman from the Alternative Travel Group. As a Palestinian Christian, he explained how his home town of Bethlehem has been changed by settlement building and the security barrier. It was sobering to walk along the snake-like wall, reading the graffiti, seeing the many homes surrounded and separated. Third, we listened to Alwyn from the Christian Peacemaker Team in Hebron. It was a unique experience, sitting together on a Hebron rooftop, hearing about military and settler activity in the region, with IDF soldiers staring at us from a rooftop next door, and other IDF soldiers patrolling the streets down below. All three of these peace group representatives implored us to speak about the occupation to people in Canada, and I'm sure that the students will do so. I'm sure that I will do so as well.

So now we just have memories. Some of us are still waking up from dreams in which we are wandering in the *souqs* of Jerusalem or Damascus. Many of us still smile when we think of camel rides or desert walks. And all of us have a new outlook on the Middle East, its religions, its politics, its people.

As we were in the midst of sharing on the last night, the evening call to prayer began to sound through the walls of the convent. We stopped talking and listened quietly to the harmonious sound, each of us wondering when we would be privileged to hear such a sound again. Some of us bought mosque alarm clocks ... but I don't think they will live up to the real thing. ■ James Friesen
