Students experienced a wide variety of activities, including scuba lessons, used book tours and an introduction to judo. Grade 10 student Jake Fast joined his grandfather, Calculus instructor Henry Fast, to share their knowledge of that sport.

One of the more unique activities might have been aspen girdling. A small group of grade 12 students, accompanied by Tracy LeClair, were led by the Nature Conservancy of Canada in a practice designed to save the Tall Grass Prairie Ecosystem in Manitoba. There is less than 0.5% of this highly endangered ecosystem left in North America, and part

of its conservation includes managing the growth of aspen trees, which — without natural predators — can take over and prohibit the survival of other endangered species within the same ecosystem. The aspen trees are stripped of a section of bark, to both kill the tree and prevent it from reproducing. Educational and fun!

WINNIPEG MUSIC FESTIVAL WINNERS



n a school that has become known for musical excellence, attention must be paid to the outstanding achievements of two of our current grade 11 students at the recent Winnipeg Music Festival. Christina Thanisch-Smith ('15) and Nick Niebuhr ('15) were top award recipients.

Christina, who has been studying vocal music with Phyllis Thompson since she was nine years old, won the Alma Wynne Memorial Trophy for most outstanding performance by a vocalist 18 years of age and under. She was victorious in four of her six competition categories and tied for first place in the other two. Her mature, rich voice has been noted in a variety of Westgate concerts and in last year's musical, *Annie*.

Nick achieved first runner-up status after studying voice with Dawn Bruch since just last year. Nick competed in three categories, winning for German Lieder and 20th Century English Music. Known for his prowess on the sports courts, we saw Nick's gift for musical performance in his role as Bert Healy in *Annie* last year.

Both Christina and Nick speak of the atmosphere of positive competition they find at the festival sessions and have made good friends with those against whom they competed. As they progressed through the levels of competition, the nerves of the first few performances lessened and they became more comfortable in the setting, surrounded by many of the same people.

"I really do this for the education," says Christina, citing the individual criticism and helpful advice from the adjudicators as such an important part of the whole experience.

Nick says the experience was well worth it and, along with Christina, hopes to compete again next year. Congratulations to you both!
