estgate Mennonite Collegiate has always been blessed by school community members who give their time and share their expertise serving on the school's Board of Directors and on various committees. We would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge two individuals who have made immeasurable contributions to Westgate over the past several years, as well as to welcome two new volunteers to their respective positions.

As Redevelopment Committee Chair, Ralph Regehr ('80) and his committee secured vital civic and court approval for the campus renewal and renovation construction project. Ralph recognized that his former school campus would not be able to meet the needs of future students, and his committee responded with a design that is as functional and accessible as it is exciting. Tom Penner ('76) gave important leadership as Chair of the newly formed Capital Campaign Committee. As a former Board Chair whose children have since graduated from Westgate, Tom understood that the school needs support from all generations of school community, where today's investment in Mennonite Education will be paid forward in the city and the world for years to come. Over the summer, both Ralph and Tom passed their responsibilities to new Chairs.



Glenn Penner is the new Chair of the Redevelopment Committee. Glenn has worked for Manitoba Hydro for over 23 years in a variety of roles as a structural engineer. In his current role as the Division Manager of Transmission Construction and Line Maintenance he is responsible for the design, construction, maintenance, and emergency restoration of Manitoba Hydro's transmission line network throughout the province. In the past several years Glenn has played a strategic role in Manitoba Hydro's efforts at relationship building with First Nation communities and other stakeholder groups. Outside of work he is involved in many volunteer roles; as a coach in a variety of sports and CAN TF4 -Urban Search and Rescue, as one of their collapsed building engineers. Glenn and his wife Alanda have four children, three of whom are currently at Westgate, and he has served on the Westgate board for a year as the representative for Bethel Mennonite Church.

GRADE SIX COMING TO WESTGATE!

We are very excited at the prospect of welcoming the first-ever class of Grade 6 students to Westgate Mennonite Collegiate in September of 2015. This is in response to learning of more public schools/school divisions transitioning to the middle school model, which will have a direct impact on many current and prospective—Westgate parents. Primary schools that had historically offered classes from Kindergarten to Grade 6 will change to K-5. Former Junior High schools (Grades 7 - 9) are shifting to the middle school format (Grades 5 -8), with their Grade 9s moving to large collegiate schools. Consequently, students in those elementary schools, and their families, would face making a transition twice in two years if they need to wait for Grade 7 to join us at Westgate.

Hence we are in the midst of planning for their inclusion in the Westgate family for Grade 6 starting with the next school year. We are inviting parents/guardians who would like more information to attend an

35-year-old German exchange program sees the second generation of exchange students. This year three students, whose parents participated in the German exchange in their Grade 11 year, will be travelling to Hamburg at the end of March to live with their German exchange partners.

Kaitlin Boyle and Monica Loewen (River East Collegiate students) and Natasha Neustaedter Barg (Westgate Mennonite Collegiate student) introduced their German exchange partners to camping, corn mazes, Canadian Thanksgiving, Hallowe'en and the Blue Bombers.

The three teens were inspired to participate in the exchange by their parents. Vicki Toews was a John Taylor Collegiate student and Gary Loewen ('84) and Krista Neustaedter Barg ('87) are both Westgate Mennonite Collegiate alumni who took part in the same Exchange program.

The majority of the Manitoba students currently come from River East Collegiate and Westgate Mennonite Collegiate with one or two from Niverville Collegiate and Manitobans for German Language Saturday School rounding out the numbers. Any Grade 10 student of German in Manitoba may apply and take part in their Grade 11 year.

Westgate-Mar Elias Student Exchange

PALESTINIAN STUDENTS ILLUMINATE COMPLEX ISSUES: A REFLECTION BY NICHOLAS WARSZA

n October 1 at 12:34 in the morning, they arrived—a group of eight Palestinian students from Ibillin in northern Israel who came to Winnipeg as part of an 11-day exchange. Being someone who values new experiences, I quickly signed up to host two of the students in my home. During their time here, we took them to a cottage to experience our Canadian wilderness, went shopping, go-karting, exploring at the Forks, took a tour of the Manitoba Legislature, got lost in a corn maze, and many other activities. What I and the other hosts quickly found out was that the similarities between us were immense and the differences were almost inconsequential.

During our weekend at the cabin we

watched a movie called *Omar* which

depicts the story of a Palestinian and the persecution he faces at the hands of Israeli authorities. The movie shows "Omar" being humiliated by Israeli "Security Officials," made to stand on top of a small rock on one leg with his hands above his head and his eyes closed for hours. One of the Palestinians sitting next to me whispered, "This kind of stuff happens all the time."

Back in Winnipeg, my parents hosted my entire extended family to meet our two guests. It was at dinner that I learned more about how difficult it was to be an Arab citizen of Israel. Basel explained that it was always his dream to become a pilot, but because he was Arab he simply wasn't allowed. As a citizen of Canada it is still impossible for me to grasp this—that because my friends are defined as Arab they are blatantly discriminated against, and there is nothing they can do about it. I explained to them that if I was in their situation I would hate my oppressors; I would hate those who told me I can't.

situation I would hate my oppressors; I would hate those who told me I can't. What they said next astounded me. They said that while they do hate the fact that they are oppressed, they do not hate their oppressors. They hate the ideas their oppressors hold, not the person who holds them. I don't remember exactly how the conversation went, but they explained to me that there's no point in hating people. By hating, we only contribute to the endless spiral that has caused so much distrust and enmity in our world.

I've thought about this conversation that I had with my friends almost every day since they left. I've been trying hard to separate the individuals from the oppressive ideas that those individuals possess. I've been trying hard to hate ideas, not people. When we begin to separate the oppressive ideologies that some people believe from the individuals that believe in them, we will break the chains that have held our human race prisoner in a cycle of hate. My Palestinian friends taught me a new way of thinking, a new way of loving, and a new way of viewing others. It is these values they taught me that give me hope.

SHARING THYME TOGETHER: THE SECOND WESTGATE-MAR ELIAS STUDENT EXCHANGE

t the beginning of October, Westgate Mennonite Collegiate hosted eight students and one teacher from the Mar Elias School. This was our second encounter of this kind. the first one being in February of 2012. The Mar Elias School is a Christian school in northern Israel. It was founded by Elias Chacour as a place of learning that would transcend the divisions of the region. Students are taught not to buy into the narrative that would pit one religion against another, which would force people to take extreme positions on the future of Israel and the occupied territories. Rather, students are taught to look at connections and find ways to think of justice and peace. Even the structure of the school is one that promotes this attitude, as it is one of the only schools in Israel that has Muslim, Christian, and Jewish teachers working together.

We have felt God's presence as we have worked on this project and we pray for God's continued presence in the future. It was humbling how the students from Ibillin

immersed themselves into our school's community, and because of their courage, we were able to truly connect with these young men and women. Indeed, we made new friends. In that vein, Westgate halls are already filled with talk about reuniting with friends as we travel to Israel/Palestine in March. I trust that our students can represent our school as wonderfully as the Palestinian students represented theirs.

e had a great experience as a host family to two of the Mar Elias students. The pace of not only scheduled events but spontaneous evening social activities filled most of the spare time for the rest of their stay. Fortunately we did have some chances to get to know our new "daughters" in more of a family setting. Going to church together the first Sunday was an interesting opportunity to dialogue about both faith



and cultural practices and that Sunday at Charleswood Mennonite Church we had communion as well as child dedication. These two events in particular, but also almost every aspect of the service from the singing to the children's story, seemed to be of interest to our guests, one of whom was from a Catholic background and the other a Muslim background. Of course both of them were entirely unfamiliar with our Canadian Mennonite approach to worship, and explaining to them what to expect before the service led into topics such as adult baptism, communion, and church authority and structure.

Another faith discussion happened at dinner one evening, after one of the girls was puzzled about the meaning of biblical references in an Israel travel guide book on our coffee table. Her line of questioning led to a discussion about the most basic concepts of Christianity relative to Islam and other faiths, such as: God, Allah (are they the same?), the Trinity, the meaning of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, and prayer. She was interested in the idea of religion or a faith understanding as an individual's choice, and even something you could change your mind about, rather than a deterministic outcome of what village or family you are born into. This seemed to be a very foreign concept to both of them and I think this reflects one of the major overall differences in our situation compared to theirs—the option of choice in so many aspects of our lives, whereas theirs seemed to be governed by many more restrictions. I am very much looking forward to being a guest in one of their homes when Westgate visits this spring, when I can be the one asking the questions and feeling the wonder of their culture.

This resulted in his selection to Team Prairies (SK/MB) for "T-12"—the Blue Jays' premier baseball academy and tournament. T-12 is an allexpenses paid event for exposure to professional and college scouts from all over North America. Being selected is considered a great honour and achievement; the players are considered to represent the best 160 Canadian amateur players with college eligibility.

This academy was comprised of players from around the world who had the potential to play at a university or professional level. The original plan was for a ride of over 1,700 km, but this was cut back to about 1,500 km, due to tornado warnings and several severe lightning storms. The final day was an exhilarating ride through Winnipeg, from Westwood to Nairn Ave., complete with a police escort of about a dozen cars and several motorcycles! inhibitions in the dark and bring their creativity into full colour.


