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That's a Wrap Westgate Retirements

FORMER COLLEAGUE OZZIE **REMPEL REFLECTS:**

KARL LANGELOTZ - It is fitting that Karl is ending his career at Westgate leading a European Study Tour. Like, his sixth. For Karl there is no question – whether as a student or as a long term teacher - time spent making connections outside of the classroom stand out as significant and meaningful.

And goodness, he's done that. More memorable for Karl than even well-delivered classroom lessons was competing and travelling

on the bus with teammates and friends; leading

study tours to Europe and the Middle East; and doing the quinzee thing with Marsh and Mountain, as well as cycling and canoe trips.

More than anything, though, it will be Karl's contribution in the coaching arena that defines his legacy. This includes Ultimate frisbee, Junior levels of volleyball and most notably, twenty years of coaching the Varsity Boys volleyball team. That's twenty years of over 200 hours a year of volunteer effort. "It was so much fun," he says. Games, tournaments, travelling to and competing in Provincials; remembering too how, as a player at Westgate, it all mattered so much. In Karl's estimate, the quality of AAA volleyball has improved dramatically during his tenure. Clearly he kept pace, as a record of being competitive at the AAAA level in two seasons, and five-time AAA Provincial Finalists, five-time AAA Provincial Champions attests.

"This is such a good place to teach" is the first thing Karl, who taught Ethics, Phys Ed and German throughout, says of that time. Yet he concedes an occasional restlessness and a recognition that he is ready for the opportunities the next chapter will present. Karl's farewell at this year's final chapel will necessarily be via video. His counsel to students: "Be engaged. Be a part of what Westgate offers. Whatever you put in you will surely get out of it." And Karl has followed this mantra, himself a part of Westgate since 1977 at age 11; and a member of staff since 1977, Karl evidently wishes for students an experience akin to his own. With a hint of emotion Karl reflects: "Westgate has shaped me - as a kid, as a teacher. It's a big chunk of who you are."

BRENT MICHOLSON - It may well be that the majority of Brent's 15 years as Westgate's Computer Technician have been spent behind the scenes. But his role was very much in the forefront of everyone's minds whenever systems failed to function. Perhaps it was with the long evenings or entire weekends spent restoring systems in mind that he quipped, "I thought I'd get out before I pulled the last three hairs out of my head." To which someone replied, "You know, since you've announced your retirement, I think I can already see some starting to grow back."

Brent came to Westgate with a depth of work experience, but was guite clear on how he'd particularly enjoyed his tenure here. This in spite of sharing, for ten years or so, a really, really tiny office. Brent credits colleague Neil Ens for making that survivable as they took turns lending an ear and sharing ideas, cheek to cheek as they were in there. Significant too, was simply being trusted to get the job done. Not a given, in his experience, and highly valued.

The changes Brent has seen in technology do not loom as large in memory as the job of moving to Chapman, during Westgate's 2017 campus redevelopment, and back. The unknowns were a major contributor to the stress, unsure of the necessary infrastructure being in place to get it all up and running - most of the time.

Brent has enjoyed his work and the staff, especially collaborating with Neil Ens and Ruth Dyck in the computer labs, but he's looking forward to what's next. He has two delightful grandchildren and is

counting on spending a lot more time with them. There's also the cottage that he built with his wife Karen. And travel to Mexico, and to music festivals, and writing more of his own songs... perhaps finally the way he might really like to spend long evenings, even whole weekends.

WILMA JOHNSON - Wilma's retirement announcement came as a bit of a surprise, and not least of all to Wilma. Observing energetic Red River College Practicum students in the library this year might have been the nudge she needed. "Perhaps it's time to give younger folk a chance at this. This does not have to be me," she recalls thinking.

That 'me' has been much more than an efficient Library Technician to Westgate. Beyond her exceptional research skills, Westgate has often also relied on Wilma's keen eye in proofreading documents, her eloquent writing and astute editing. She has worked with costumes, managed props and produced our One Act Plays. Accompanying a Music Tour to New York and Pennsylvania made for some terrific memories as well.

Changes? She's seen a few. Wilma's time spent troubleshooting computers and doing online research are far removed from her electric typewriter and the fierce debate in the '90s over introducing the internet to the school. "And young teachers now depend much less on book use. Still," she says, "some assignments requiring book research only have students surprised at what they can find in there." Some things, though, do remain constant. There are always

students waiting eagerly at her door at 7:50 a.m. Wilma has made the library a special refuge.

Wilma can't overstate the enormity of the task of packing up and moving the library, twice. She remembers Chapman to be a challenging year. She doesn't miss that, but will most definitely miss the bustle, the people, and the students the most – those high school students she'd found a tad intimidating when she first transitioned from work in an elementary school.

Wilma is looking forward to travel and is particularly excited to become a first-time grandmother in July. She says she has a list of good books to read, too.

> **SARA JANZEN** - After studying Psychology

and Forensic Anthropology, serving at L'Arche Lethbridge through MVS and being a valued Educational Assistant at Westgate for three years, the logical next

step: obvious! Sarah intends to study Accounting at Red River College.

Sarah felt fortunate to join in Westgate's transition year at Chapman and enjoyed the high level of interaction - part of the challenge of sharing space with the library and being in the very centre of things.

Sarah took full advantage of Westgate opportunities as a student; seen now through an adult lens, she appreciates the very intentional community those options foster. And she's kept at it: camping with the Grade 9s, and joining her second canoe trip in as many years this June.

Sarah has especially enjoyed the friendships she has made on staff across the great demographic divide. From young teachers to staff approaching retirement, she noted that all seem to enjoy each other and are united in working toward and celebrating student growth. "That's been the best," she says. "Watching students grow, and seeing them getting it."



SCHOOL NEWS





Alumni Tuition Reduction Announcement


For decades Westgate has offered a Supporting Congregation Tuition Rate to Parents of enrolled students who are members of one of our 13 Supporting Congregations.



WESTGATE ADULT TOUR MIRRORS STUDENT HOPES FOR PEACE IN THE MIDDLE EAST

After a long tradition of Middle East study tours, and many requests by enthusiastic parents and friends of the student participants, Westgate has finally created a Middle East Adult Study Tour.

James Friesen, originator and leader of most of the ME student tours, speaks about the almost overwhelming interest: "Parents of participants were often astounded at how continuously their sons and daughters would talk about their experiences after returning home." As well, Westgate parents hosting the exchange Palestinian students were intrigued with the new perspectives and deep discussions about life 'out there' that happened at their supper tables here in Winnipeg. "After hearing about the Middle East from so many 'secondary' sources," Friesen continues, "it seemed important to expand the opportunity of primary experiences to the wider Westgate community."

And so, forty adult travellers ventured out on March 4, 2019 for 16 days on the first Westgate Adult Middle East Study tour. Not surprisingly, many of the adult motives for participating matched their student counterparts. Chris Dirks states: "My motivation in going was primarily on my wife's recommendation. She had been part of two of the students' study tours as a teacher and both times came back so very enthusiastic about her experiences, and especially the connection to her faith. This was also a departure from the winter holidays I normally take and promised an adventure a little outside my comfort zone."

Toby Bergman ('19) a participant of the 2019 study tour, also speaks about the faith connections. He comments with enthusiasm about Mr. Friesen's Christian Studies class: "I was interested to learn about how religions interacted with each other, and to see how this was happening in the Holy Land, and how this connected to my faith." Zoe Dyck ('19) and Andrea Sutherland ('19), both chose the Middle East tour because, as



Zoe states, "it was a place I would not feel comfortable with traveling on my own," although Zoe confides that she now realizes "I could have easily traveled there by myself."

Part of the cache for the adult tour was also the leadership. As Chris Dirks indicates: "Knowing that the group leader was James Friesen with his contacts in the Middle East would make this trip extraordinary." And, so it proved to be. Paul Daudet notes: "Kudos to James for managing to keep forty adults engaged and interested with lots of different events and ideas from morning 'til night for over two weeks!"

And what highlights there were indeed! As Chris Dirks reflects: "My knowledge of the Middle East was basically what I have seen and heard in the media. I was hoping that this trip would give me a better understanding of the situation there, as well as experiencing the sights and sounds of the Holy Land. The addition of the Jordanian experience was well positioned in the middle of the trip and provided some major highlights in Petra, the Wadi Rum desert, and the Dead Sea.

"The last number of days in Bethlehem and Jerusalem were to say the least, 'fascinating.' The complexity of three major religions claiming Jerusalem as an important holy city was incredibly unique. A poignant moment for me was on Friday when I was following Christian pilgrims down the Via Dolorosa. We had stopped at one of the stations of the cross, observing priests and monks leading the faithful in prayer. During that time there was also the Muslim call to prayer thundering out over the loudspeakers, all under the watchful gaze of machine gun laden Israeli soldiers. This is life in Jerusalem.

"We also spent time visiting cities in the West Bank and saw firsthand how Palestinians are coping with the coexistence between them and the Israelis."

Students, too, had their poignant moments, on the 2019 student tour that often mirrored the adults' experiences. Toby Bergman remembers: "We were walking in Hebron (in the West Bank) and our group could easily walk through the checkpoint, but we saw people being stopped and harassed just because they looked different. I couldn't even see how they were different. I have never witnessed anything like this before." As Andrea Sutherland reiterates: "Seeing all the history there and [the history] being made there as we could see the conflict and its effects – this was eye-opening."

But Andrea also notes that her most profound moment was witnessing a fully armed Israeli soldier find a chair to provide a resting place for a pregnant woman. "This changed my idea of those people," she adds thoughtfully.

After returning home, adult tour representatives Lois Litz, John Ilg, and Terry Dirks along with student reps Toby Bergmann, Andrea Sutherland and Luke Regehr met with Mennonite Church Canada's Working Group on

the Resolution for Israel/Palestine.
After a two hour discussion of our observations and experiences, our united concern was for the future of this region and our responsibility in this regard. Toby Bergmann reflects for us all: "Most important is now the use of our knowledge to spread awareness of the injustice there. In North America this needs to be brought to the forefront,

with hope that solutions will be found sooner, under this pressure. This has been a transformative experience for us. Others need to understand as well."

It is a keen wish of all participants, that future Westgate Adult tours will be offered and form a new tradition which may offer some hope for peace in this beautiful but troubled part of our world.

From simulating reality to creating entirely impossible impressions, Graham uses a combination of math, simulation, and animation to create his effects.
