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Delivering the Goods

Shortly after graduating, Ben reconciled his love of cycling and the need for an income and got a job as a bike messenger here in Winnipeg. He quickly found himself loving the tight-knit community and connected to bike messengers all over the globe. He moved on to larger (and warmer) places, working in Toronto and Montreal before 'settling down' in Vancouver.

Ben's journey this summer to Jakarta started with a short warm-up ride from London, England to Istanbul, Turkey. He left London with 80 other couriers and cycled to Brussels to compete in the European Cycle Messenger Championships at the end of June. From there his 'bikepacking' trip took him through Basel,

Milan, Zagreb, Belgrade, Sofia, and, finally, Istanbul. As he summarized the ride -3431 km of cycling, 23,087 m of climbing, 26 days, 13 nights camping at the side of the road, and only one flat tire.

He then traveled from Istanbul to Jakarta (by plane) for the main event - a 6 day competition with couriers from around the world. Ben and about 300 other couriers explored the city by racing 'alleycats', or simulation races. Competitors also took part in side events, such as track standing, longest skid, and 'foot-down' - which Ben describes as "kind of like a mosh pit on a bike; you're just trying to knock each other over. Last one standing wins" which sounds...just

Having survived these early festivities, Ben entered the weekend qualifiers, and he and about 80 other messengers advance to the finals. The final race, which can last up to 4 hours, takes place on a closed course with competitors simulating a work day. They're given a map and several manifests, picking up and delivering packages all over the course. After the dust had settled Ben had a silver medal and the satisfaction of knowing that, not only does he love his job, it turns out he's really quite good at it, too.

This is Ben's third World Championship. He's raced in Riga, Latvia in 2018, and Montreal in 2017. No doubt he'll be back again next year in Bogota, Colombia, not because he's hungry for glory, but because of the international community he's found that has embraced him, given him couches to sleep on across the globe, and created lasting friendships. Who wouldn't want more of that?

VOICES CRYING OUT

On Friday, September 27th the halls of Westgate were quieter than normal. The usual buzz of activity was lessened as two-thirds of the student population decided that instead of attending classes they would work for their future in another way - by striking to stop climate change.

According to grade 12 students Olivia Pries-Mallet and Jenna Martin who were at the strike, there was a palpable tension between fear and hope.

"It was chilling to see such a big group scared for our future," Olivia said, "especially seeing young kids chanting about how the world is changing for the worse."

"It feels like we can't do a lot about it, but we can start a conversation," added Jenna.

But both grade 12 students felt empowered being part of the group that hopes to change things for the better. "You can either be scared the world's





ending or go to the climate strike and try to make a difference," Jenna stated emphatically.

Before the official strike began the Westgate Concert Choir participated in an ecumenical prayer service for the Earth, adding their voices to leaders from the Jewish, Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist and Christian communites.

"It's important for students to see all these faiths represented, with everyone saying the same thing," said Vic Pankratz, who lead the choir that day.

The choir sang Earth Song by Frank Ticheli.

The words are simple, powerful:

"This dark stormy hour, The wind, it stirs. The scorched earth Cries out in vain...

But music and singing Have been my refuge, And music and singing Shall be my light."

"Someone writes these beautiful words and the students get to communicate them to others. They get to have a voice in this crying out," Pankratz said.

When asked why they decided to add their voices to the strike, Olivia and Jenna were clear: "We're in school to learn for our future. We were protesting for our future."

A CHRISTMAS CAROL - NOV 13-15

2019 marks the centennial anniversary of the Winnipeg general strike. The city has commemorated the event with a new art installment in front of the Pantages Playhouse Theatre, Rainbow Stage ran Strike! The Musical, and the Manitoba Museum modified their "early Winnipeg" exhibit to highlight the feel of Winnipeg during the spring of 1919. We found it only fitting to set the Charles Dickens classic A Christmas Carol against a background when worker – employee relations were challenged, and greed nearly conquered goodwill. Students at Westgate began the process of turning the original text to script as early as June, as Aurora Wiebe and Nora Kroeger (both class of 2019) worked on interpreting the text and setting the tone for the directors to follow. As classes began in September, students started the audition process; rehearsals and workshopping

the script immediately followed. Over the next ten weeks, the cast began to breathe life into Dickens' ghosts, while Kathy Pankratz and her costume crew designed and constructed over fifty costumes. WHAT MAKES A SCHOOL? Over and over again, the members of the class of '69 remembered the connections they had with one another and the respect and love they had for their teachers as the best part of their Westgate experience.

On September 5th, 13 members from the class of 1969 and their guests gathered at 86 Westgate. They enjoyed a tour of the redeveloped facility and could be overheard marvelling at how they "survived" and even "thrived" with such a different facility back in the day. They complimented the current Westgate community for making the effort to "better the tools".

The celebration continued at the University of Winnipeg Women's Club, with life storytelling and sharing memories, and then ended with a wonderful dinner at Bistro Dansk. Special thanks to class members Lorie (Fast) Bergen and Helga (Klassen) Berger who took leadership in making this event come to be!

As part of the time at 86 West Gate, it was interesting for current staff to interview our alumni and learn of a different time: a time when the facilities limited sports opportunities to just

the male students; a time when young women would leave school (even if they loved it) after grade 10 to go join the workforce and contribute to the family income. Other common memories were more familiar to today: having the football end up in the river during lunch pick up games; getting in trouble for uncontrolled giggling with friends; and enjoying coffee in the local cafes.

Many alumni of '69' remembered being challenged to try things they were not sure they could do. They were given opportunities to explore and serve in many ways. This resulted in lives of volunteering and working for their churches and wider communities. Among the group, music and life in the church played a big role. Of the 13 gathered, at least half of them cited being part of church choirs, boards and being accompanists to choirs (25% of them).

There was a deep hope that Westgate will continue to be a place in which students are met where they are at, respected and honoured, inspired and taught and sent into the world with a sense of who they are, rooted and confident because of where they have come from. May it be so.

IN MEMORIAM

Anne and Aron's children, Ed, Carol and Eric attended Westgate and Mrs. Loewen took keen interest in the activities and progress her granddaughters' Mielen, Rebecca and Melissa's experienced in the school she had devoted so much time and energy to support.
