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#### **Responding to Calls**



This school is built on Treaty 1 Territory. These lands are the traditional territories of the Anishinaabeg, Ininiwak, Dakota, and Nakota Nations and the homeland of the Metis Nation. We are grateful to the Indigenous Peoples for their stewardship of this land and the hospitality that enables our community to learn, worship, and serve God the Creator here. We acknowledge the harms that the settler community has brought upon the Indigenous Peoples of this land. As a school grounded in the peace tradition, we want to work for reconciliation.

For years, students, staff, and the broader community have called Westgate to take seriously the historic and present realities of Indigenous communities with whom we share this land, including lament for trauma, respect for worldview and celebration of varied and vibrant Indigenous cultures. These calls draw out our responsibility as an educational institution to teach truth, and as an Anabaptist-Mennonite institution to take action. Recently, we have begun to formalize the various strands of our response to create a more



consistent plan through the work of a Volunteer Staff Committee. Although we know we will make mistakes as we engage in this work, we are eager to begin our part in the journey towards respectful reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples.



While education does not always happen formally, how teachers design courses frames conversations and attitudes. Many of our teachers have been looking at learning resources to integrate Indigenous perspectives into their curricula. This year in grade 7 ELA, students began their course with a focus on Indigenous literature. In his novel *The Case of Windy Lake*, author Michael Hutchison, citizen of the Misipawistik Cree Nation in the Treaty 5 territory north of Winnipeg, writes about four cousins growing up on Windy Lake First Nation who are trying to solve the mystery of a missing archeologist. The hope is that through this novel study, Westgate students will build intercultural understanding, empathy, and mutual respect.

Currently, a student action group open to all grades meets at lunch hours to discuss and plan ways of acknowledging consequences of settler harm to Indigenous communities and ways of enacting truth and reconciliation in our community.

Westgate relies heavily on our community for all of our programs and initiatives. We encourage you to listen and respond to the calls around you, and to collaborate with us and your wider community in seeking truth and reconciliation.


















#### **Peer Support**

#### **A Broader Reading Experience**




For many, it is through art that we find a window to lives different than our own.

Over the last few years ELA teachers at Westgate have put in effort to reflect a greater diversity in the authors of the books taught in class.

When Jeremy Siemens began teaching grade 10 ELA he noticed that texts were often from the same perspective, not to mention time periods far removed from students' current experiences. "I sought to bring in contemporary texts from authors who provide a range of experiences," including Katherena Vermette's The Break and Yaa Gyasi's Homegoing. With these additions to his program, Jeremy Siemens has found that, along with many other benefits, he spends less time providing era-specific context and more time discussing the themes and artistic styles of books.

In her grade 7 ELA class Heidi Koop's students get to choose from a list of novels for a guided book club. "I





am always looking for a way to make my classroom a safe learning environment for all students, but I am also encouraging students to develop empathy, respect, and understanding beyond their own experience. Books can play a vital role in this. Recently, I've been adding books that help students to develop anti-racist perspectives, appreciation for Indigenous experiences, and an understanding for different gender identities."



As Westgate ELA teachers continue to work at broadening their curricula with the new texts and new genres, Westgate students will be given the opportunity to read classics of the Western canon, graphic novels, short stories, fantasies, dystopian fiction and many other diverse genres. Through reading such a wide range of material, by such a wide range of authors, they will hopefully get to see themselves reflected, see the complexities of the world, and have a window into the experiences of people completely different than they are.
