

A WESTGATE PERSPECTIVE

This year we bid farewell to five beloved teaching staff: Paul Dyck, Herb Guenther, Terry Dirks, Helen Janzen, and Bob Hummelt. With well over 100 years of Westgate experience between them, these teachers have made an indelible mark on the school, both through their teaching and support for extracurricular programs, and through their character and contribution to the community. Who will plant flowers and squash at 86 West Gate when Helen and Paul are gone? When Terry retires, who will fill the staff room table (and many a classroom table) with delicious treats from one of Winnipeg's best bakeries? After Herb retires, who can students gently nudge into a 30 minute devo? And how will the school continue without Bob's meandering allegories to help us understand who we are?

Given how much Westgate will miss these staff, we were relieved to hear that they will miss us too. We asked each of these teachers to reflect on what they are going to miss about their work at Westgate, and all of them mentioned the students first. Terry and Helen mentioned just how much they will miss seeing their students engaged in the learning process, and challenging themselves to create and explore. Paul and Herb both mentioned interacting with students through extracurriculars, such as Marsh & Mountain hikes, One Act Plays, and coaching. But it's not just the scheduled courses and events



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that they'll leave behind. "Watching kids grow up is a really nice part of Westgate," said Paul. Bob agreed, saying it's the "kibbutzing in hallways" that he'll really miss. "Teenagers are just great!" added Terry.

All five teachers reflected on how much they will miss the staff community. Terry said she experienced excellent camaraderie and a strong sense of belonging in her time at Westgate, pushing her to grow as a professional. Helen called the environment between colleagues "supportive and encouraging". Herb was enticed to work at Westgate by the strong Christian community. He remembers being in high school himself and feeling embarrassment at being a Mennonite, but now he has been part of a high school in which he leads devotions every morning, and where he shares common goals and beliefs with his colleagues. Being in this environment of shared faith allowed Herb to not only grow as a teacher, but as a Christian.

When asked what they're looking forward to about leaving their roles at Westgate, the responses were understandably similar. "I'm looking forward to not having to be somewhere on time," said Bob. "No rushing to the next evening concert or sporting event." Terry agreed, looking forward to "that beautiful freedom to plan your life according to just you and your family and friends," not the demands of "a million other people". Helen spoke of her retired husband and friends who have just been waiting for her to have more time to spend with them. Herb expressed excitement at having the time to take care of himself and feel good, even describing the new schedule he's taking on: a workout every morning, a nap after lunch. Paul expressed the same sentiment a bit more poetically. "Teachers have a time-scarcity mindset," he said. "I look forward to living a more time-abundant lifestyle."

With an emptier calendar comes time for new adventures. Paul, after spending only four years teaching, is excited to return to full-time learning. He has purchased land near Gull Lake in order to practice permaculture, hoping to work alongside natural processes to establish a sustainable agricultural ecosystem. Paul also plans to complete land-based educational training in the near future, and looks forward to future field trips up to Gull Lake. It sounds like Westgate students may have the opportunity to learn a lot more about permaculture alongside Mr. Dyck!

But new adventures aren't just for those in the early stages of their careers. Herb looks forward

to renovations, travel, and a new shared life with his partner. Helen is excited to try more sculpting and painting. And Terry is keen to find other ways of contributing to the world, including a possible second career as a writer. "I'm still looking to explore myself as a few other things besides a teacher," she said.

Bob is not as keen to make plans. During his 18 years as principal he guided Westgate through many hiring processes, a massive renovation project, and pandemic restrictions, as well as being a significant voice in nearly every committee's visioning and long-term planning. After all this, Bob's looking forward to seeing what opportunities find him, instead of having to pursue them himself.

Westgate begins its 2022-2023 school year on September 7th. That day will be full of excitement, as we welcome new teachers and make plans for the year. However, we will also be feeling the absence of all five of these amazing Westgate staff, and wanted to know what they will be doing on that momentous day. "I'm going to be at my cabin, enjoying a coffee on the deck, looking over Brereton Lake," said Terry, though she noted she's just as likely to have a troupe of grandchildren to look after. "I will be sitting on my deck surrounded by my flowers with an intriguing book in one hand, a whipping cream topped mocha in the other," said Helen. Herb hopes to be enjoying his newly renovated kitchen and bathroom space - renovations which he, of course, plans to do himself this summer. Paul imagines he'll be up on the land at Gull Lake, preparing a meal out of local ingredients, and sleeping in a tree house. Bob will be "sitting on my dock at Long Pine Lake, knowing that I'd otherwise be in the car heading home." We wish Paul, Herb, Terry, Helen and Bob all the best, as they create new communities and schedules in which they can be at home.

The last two years have challenged students and staff to learn and be creative in new ways. 

The BIPOC Alliance has been an idea in our minds for a few years now. The reason we started the Alliance this year is because we felt the effects of racism towards the Asian community during the pandemic, and we wanted to bring awareness to racism that has gone unspoken during our time at Westgate. Our plan was to create a safe space for BIPOC students to share their stories and to connect, and for white students to learn how to be allies and how to create a safer environment for everyone at Westgate.

Throughout our time this year, we learned that although everyone's individual experiences are unique, there is often overlap between stories, which helps us to empathize with each other. We also learned that there are many students at Westgate who are willing to take the initiative to educate themselves and listen.

We have been pleasantly surprised by the support from both students and staff, with around 40 people attending each meeting. We have also noticed teachers at Westgate taking our comments about racism, and making a conscious effort to do better.

The way that BIPOC Alliance reached out to the student body was by holding monthly meetings open to everyone which addressed several different topics regarding racism. Some of these topics included microaggressions and allyship. We also had a smaller planning team with BIPOC students who wanted a leadership role within the Alliance. Throughout the year, we found that these meetings were a good source of support for us and our peers when talking about our experiences

with racism. Our last, and biggest event, of the year was to hold a Dim-Sum meal (a Chinese meal) to celebrate May being Asian Heritage Month. It was a great way to end the year. We felt that it was meaningful to share a bit of our Chinese culture with the Westgate community, and it was inspiring and gratifying to see everyone having a good time.

Moving forward from our time at Westgate, we hope that the BIPOC Alliance continues to grow and to share important stories from the past and present. We hope that it continues to be a safe space for BIPOC students, as well as being accessible for those willing to learn. It is an important step forward that Westgate has a group dedicated to hearing BIPOC student voices in the school. We are thankful that we have been able to start this Alliance, and are excited to see where the future takes it.
